President's Message



It has been more than a year since the WHO declared COVID 19 a pandemic and a year since I became President of CTS. Together, we can reflect on a year filled with challenges, grief, and hope. One of the biggest lessons we can take from the pandemic is the power of collaboration to come up with solutions quickly, something that will serve us all in the long run.

As a member of the Canadian Respiratory Health Professionals (CRHP), taking on the leadership position as CTS President has been the result of a long road to build interprofessional collaboration and fills me with hope for the future. I remember a time when CRHP and CTS were very separate and distinct entities. Fast forward to 2015 when CRHP agreed to join CTS on the path to become an independent professional society. In 2021, CRHP is undeniably an integral part of CTS, and there are no more barriers to collaboration and co-leadership. The evolution to include CRHP has made us stronger and continues to enrich our interdisciplinary professional society.

My year as president has been filled with challenges and opportunities. The cancellation of the 2020 Canadian Respiratory Conference was a major loss and had a negative impact on the CTS budget. But CTS faced this head on, and in response to the pandemic were able to attract some new resources for the development of COVID-19 clinical guidance to support our members and healthcare professionals in the wider respiratory community. As has been said, 'great things happen when we work together' and there is no time that this has not been truer. Collaboration has been the hallmark of CTS over the past year. In April 2020, the CTS convened a pan-Canadian Respiratory Roundtable of professional societies and patient organizations to facilitate the sharing of information and strategies during the pandemic and to identify areas of common interest and potential collaboration. A number of important initiatives emerged:

 a collaboration between CTS and the Canadian Society for Respiratory Therapy (CSRT) to produce a joint position statement on standards for the resumption of pulmonary function testing in the post-peak phase of the pandemic. We have subsequently collaborated with CSRT on related advocacy targeting the federal and provincial/territorial Ministries of Health;

- development of a joint statement on vaccine prioritization for people with respiratory disease that involved 20+ organizations and a social media campaign to promote awareness at the federal and provincial/territorial level
- publication of an evidence-based statement on clinical triage thresholds for people with respiratory disease;
- a collaboration with McGill University to establish a repository of clinical research for healthcare professionals related to COVID-19, and
- Roundtable participants disseminated CTS guidance documents to their constituents and translated our guidance into public and patient education materials and programs.

The Respiratory Roundtable has helped healthcare professionals and patients access the most up to date evidence-based information and medical expertise on issues impacting their lung health in the time of COVID-19. CTS will continue to foster the opportunities to collaborate with the respiratory community beyond the pandemic.

We have also taken strides this past year to position CTS as the national authority for respiratory medicine and research with the federal and provincial governments. With the support of Impact Public Affairs, we have disseminated our position papers to provincial/territorial and national Ministers of Health and responded to invitations to meet to discuss clinical triage thresholds (NL) and protection of healthcare professionals and patients during pulmonary function testing (ON). We prepared a Pre-Budget Submission to the House of Commons Finance Committee and had the opportunity in February to meet with the Chair to present our recommendations for federal investments related to a secure supply of PPE, a strategy to combat vaccine hesitancy, improved access to pulmonary rehabilitation, and increased funding for respiratory research.

It has been a privilege to serve as President of CTS. A huge shoutout to CTS staff and especially to our members and volunteers whose commitment to this work is extraordinary.



Developing the Next Generation of Clinicians and Researchers

The new model for CTS Clinical Assembly Steering Committees includes positions for Early Career representatives. Implementation of this model was successfully achieved in 2020 with the Asthma and COPD Assemblies. Succession planning is underway in 2021 for the Interstitial Lung Disease, Home Mechanical Ventilation, Sleep Disordered Breathing and Pulmonary Vascular Disease Steering Committees.

Expanding Collaboration, Expertise and Impact

CTS is expanding collaboration and leveraging partnerships to address priorities and solve challenges.



COVID-19 Respiratory Roundtable

CTS established the COVID-19 Respiratory Roundtable in April 2020, a forum of over 20 respiratory health organizations who meet regularly to exchange information on pandemic-related activities. This network has allowed health care professionals and patients to access the most up to date evidence-based information and medical expertise on issues impacting their lung health. In January 2021, Roundtable stakeholders issued a joint statement urging the federal, provincial and territorial governments to prioritize people living with lung disease who are at higher risk for more serious COVID-19 complications in the vaccination rollout. The Roundtable is now working to address the challenges around vaccination and ongoing issues related to post-COVID patient care.

Advising Health Canada - Drug Shortages Unit

CTS provided technical advice to Health Canada on the salbutamol shortage and prepared guidance for clinicians and patients on substitutions for <u>asthma</u> and <u>COPD</u>. CTS was represented in a multi-stakeholder group by CTS members Drs. Mohit Bhutani, Chris Licskai and Connie Yang. CTS continues to collaborate with the Canadian Pharmacists Association and the Canadian Medical Association.

Support for People with Advance Respiratory Disease

CTS created a new inter-professional community of practice on Support for People with Advance Respiratory Disease (through to palliative care) to provide a forum for information-sharing and the eventual development of standards and training. This initiative is being led by CTS/CRHP member Donna Goodridge.

Research

CTS supports national respiratory research priorities and promotes lung health research and ensures optimal respiratory care is informed by the best research evidence. In 2020, CTS provided 7 letters of support for COVID related grant applications (3 as a Knowledge End User), and 10 letters of support for research grants (5 as a Knowledge End User). The CTS Executive met with the Scientific Director and leadership team of the Institute of Circulatory and Respiratory Health of the Canadian Institutes of Health Research in November 2020 to exchange information, interests and explore potential collaborations.

National and International Partnerships

CTS is focused on *enhancing partnerships* with other organizations including, the American Thoracic Society (ATS), CHEST (American College of Chest Physicians), European Respiratory Society (ERS), Canadian Cardiovascular Society, Canadian Pharmacists Association, Canadian Sleep Society, Canadian Society for Respiratory Therapy and the Canadian Lung Association.

CTS has official representation in national coalitions and networks such as the Canadian Respiratory Research Network, Canadian Sleep and Circadian Network, Choosing Wisely Canada, and Immunize Canada.

Advocacy and Government Relations

2020 Public Facing Campaigns

Impact Public Affairs was engaged in 2020 to support the dissemination and awareness of our COVID-19 publications and to develop an advocacy and government relations strategy. A Pre-Budget Submission was prepared for the House of Commons Finance Committee for the 2021 federal budget. CTS had the opportunity to meet with the Chair to present our recommendations for federal investments related to a secure supply of PPE, a strategy to combat vaccine hesitancy, improved access to pulmonary rehabilitation, and increased funding for respiratory research. Social media infographics on the wearing of masks and vaccination were created and information provided to MPs for their fall letter campaign coinciding with the return to school and work. The statement on clinical triage thresholds and pulmonary function testing were disseminated to federal, provincial, and territorial ministers of health.







CTS is advocating that Budget 2021 continue to invest in broad-based promotion of vaccinations, including but not limited to COVID-19 vaccines. This is important to combat vaccine hesitancy widely in order to reduce pressures on Canada's healthcare system and deliver better health outcomes for all Canadians.







Canadians with lung disease deserve early protection from COVID-19 and should be prioritized in vaccination programs.






